The comptroller would be required to withhold state appropriated funds from the agency if it fails to file the reports within 10 days after the federal due date. The comptroller could enter into agreements with the responsible state agencies and make rules to facilitate compliance.

SB 1266 would take effect October 1, 1997.

NOTES: The committee amendments would redefine a pack of cigarettes and require other state agencies to file federally mandated reports with the comptroller.
