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	The bill also would prevent use of these subsidized services to view or download obscene materials. Internet access through the regional education service centers is designed to provide education-related information, not pornography. The use of filtering software could prevent students from obtaining inappropriate material.
OPPONENTS SAY:	CSHB 1330 would create a state law for a problem that is being addressed at a local level. Children should not have access to obscene materials, but prevention is the responsibility of school districts and is being implemented through different approaches, including filtering software and usage agreements. This allows local areas to use the system that works best for them. The state should not create a single inflexible standard but should leave this responsibility to the school districts.
NOTES:	The committee substitute would restrict the scope of the bill to home access. It deleted a provision in the filed version that would have required the regional education service center to limit a person's use of the Internet service to 35 hours per week.
