BACKGROUND: Education Code, ch. 25 governs admission and enrollment requirements,

> student transfers, the operation of schools, school attendance, student/teacher ratios, and class size. Sec. 25.081 requires each school district to provide at least 180 days of instruction for students annually. This does not apply to a school district that operates its schools on a year-round system. The education commissioner may approve fewer than 180 days of instruction if a disaster, flood, extreme weather conditions, fuel curtailment, or another calamity

causes the closing of schools.

DIGEST: SB 862 would require a school district to provide for district schools to be

closed each year on Memorial Day.

The bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record

vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect

September 1, 2003.

SUPPORTERS

It is important that Texas school children and their families and teachers SAY: honor American veterans of wars and those who have died while serving their

country. Most working adults have this day off from work, and their children

should be able to observe this holiday with them.

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OPPONENTS SAY:

This type of decision should be left to the discretion of local school districts. Even though most schools do observe Memorial Day, it is not mandated, because this day can be used as a makeup day — for example, for an instructional day lost because of bad weather. Districts need to retain the flexibility to address their students' needs while meeting the mandate that schools provide at least 180 days of instruction per year.
