BACKGROUND: Elections Code, sec. 86.014 allows anyone to obtain a copy of an early

> voting ballot application 72 hours after the ballot is mailed to the voter or 48 hours after the ballot is mailed to the voter if the mailing occurs on the

fourth day before Election Day.

DIGEST: SB 997 would prohibit the public from seeing a copy of an early voting

> ballot application until the first business day after Election Day. Only the voter could see a copy to verify the information on the application was

correct.

The bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take

effect September 1, 2011.

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SUPPORTERS SAY:

Allowing members of the public to inspect any early voting ballot application facilitates certain election fraud. With access to these applications, persons wishing to commit election fraud can seek out voters who request voter assistance and fraudulently fill out their ballots contrary to the voter's wishes.

In the interest of preserving public information, SB 997 would allow these applications to be seen by members of the public after the election, so as to prevent this type of fraud.

OPPONENTS SAY:

The inspection of early voting ballot applications allows the public an opportunity to ensure there is no mail-in ballot fraud. Currently, a member of the public can check a ballot application to ensure the individual is legally permitted to vote. The bill should be amended to allow the public to inspect early voting ballot applications before Election Day.

NOTES:

An amendment, acceptable to the sponsor, would permit the public to see a copy of an early voting ballot application only after the corresponding election ballot had been received by the authority conducting the election.
