BACKGROUND: The 84th Legislature in 2015 passed HB 2804 by Aycock, changing the

> public school accountability system to use letter grades of A-F to rate school districts and campuses in 2018. A preliminary report from the Texas Education Agency to the 85th Legislature on A-F ratings said the system should not be built on a forced distribution so that some set percentage of campuses must get an A or an F. The report said it should

be mathematically possible that all campuses achieve an A rating.

DIGEST:

HB 2782 would require the Commissioner of Education, for purposes of assigning school districts and campuses an overall and a domain performance rating, to ensure that the method used to evaluate performance:

- was not implemented in a way that provided for a specific designated distribution of ratings to districts and campuses under which a designated percentage received an A rating or an F rating; and
- was implemented in a way that provided the mathematical possibility that all districts and campuses received an A rating.

The bill would apply beginning with the 2017-18 school year.

This bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2017.
