BACKGROUND:

Water Code sec. 28A.102 establishes the penalties the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality may asses for the failure of an aggregate production operation to register itself. Fines are at least \$5,000 and no more than \$10,000 for each year the operation is not registered, with a

maximum total penalty of no more than \$25,000 for an aggregate production operation that is operated in three or more years without being registered.

Concerns have been raised that current fines are insufficient to incentivize compliance with registration of aggregate production operators.

DIGEST:

HB 907 would increase penalties for failure of an aggregate production operation to register with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality. The minimum penalty would increase from \$5,000 per year to \$10,000. The maximum penalty would increase from \$10,000 per year to \$20,000. The maximum total penalty for three or more years of noncompliance would increase from \$25,000 to \$50,000.

The bill would take effect September 1, 2019.
