DIGEST: HB 2343 would allow the Department of Public Safety (DPS) to use

appropriated funds to buy food and beverages for individuals who were

activated to provide services in response to an emergency situation,

incident, or disaster and were unable to leave or were required to remain at their assignment areas due to the emergency. The bill also would make

the use of funds to provide food and beverages for training functions

required of DPS peace officers subject to director approval.

This bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds

record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take

effect September 1, 2021.

SUPPORTERS

SAY:

HB 2343 would allow the Department of Public Safety (DPS) to take proper care of its personnel by restoring the department's authority to provide food and beverages for officers responding to an emergency or a disaster. This authority was inadvertently revoked when the Texas Division of Emergency Management was moved from DPS's purview to

the Texas A&M University System. HB 914 simply would restore the

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ability of DPS to provide for its personnel in emergencies or disasters without having to rely on private donations.

The bill would not create a burden on taxpayers since it specifically relates to the use of funds already appropriated to DPS. The department should be able to use these funds to support critical emergency personnel who are risking their health and wellbeing for public safety.

CRITICS SAY:

HB 2343 would require unfairly that taxpayers subsidize food and beverages for emergency personnel, expenditures that private individuals and businesses must incur for themselves.
