DIGEST:	HB 24 would require the commissioner of education to distribute funds, from funds appropriated for the purpose or any other available funds, to each school district to provide at least one playground in the district that was inclusive and accessible for students with disabilities.
	The bill would apply beginning with the 2021-2022 school year.
	The bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2021.
NOTES:	According to the Legislative Budget Board, the bill would have a negative impact of \$212.6 million in general revenue related funds through fiscal 2023.
